

HOW HOT? TOO HOT!



120°

Within 30 minutes, the car's interior can climb from 85° to 120°.

102°

On an 85° day, it only takes ten minutes for the inside of your car to reach 102°.

90°

Even if the temperature outside is only 70°, the inside of your car may be as much as 20 degrees hotter.

REMEMBER:

- Young, elderly, overweight, short-muzzled pets and pets with thick or dark-colored coats are most at risk for overheating.
- A vehicle may overheat even with windows left open an inch or two.
- Shade moves with the sun and provides little protection on a hot day.
- It is prohibited by law in many areas to leave pets unattended in a vehicle under unsafe conditions, including a hot day.



IF YOU SEE A PET IN A CAR ON A HOT DAY, TRY TO LOCATE THE OWNER, OR CALL 911! STAY BY THE CAR UNTIL HELP ARRIVES.
